



2019 High School Football Preview

The famous author Stephen King once said, "sooner or later everything old is new again." That's certainly true for the upcoming high school football campaign. A new conference with a name that's similar to an old league moniker, new players ready to excel at programs where winning never gets old, and fans of gridiron action, old and new alike, getting excited for a season to kick off. The anticipation of high school football starting never gets old, so let's see what's in store for this new campaign we are embarking on.

Some old rivalries will be renewed in the brand new Lorain County League this fall. This new eight-team conference incorporates Lorain County teams who previously competed in the PAC and some of those had also been in the Lorain County Conference (see Tim Gebhardt's article in this edition of Forecast for an indepth look at the new "LC8").

Clearview is the team in the new league coming off the best season in '18. Mike Collier's Clippers roared to a 9-1 regular season and also notched a playoff win to finish 10-2 last year. It was Clearview's second straight playoff appearance. The Clips will have senior Jason Christensen back at quarterback, leading an attack that scored over 34 points per game last year. Christensen also plays defensively in the secondary. Other two-way standouts returning for Clearview are two wide receivers/defensive backs, Joseph Norris and Jordan Reed; CJ Fleming, a running back and defensive end; Robert Davis, a running back and defensive back; and Stacey Littlejohn, a two way lineman.

Columbia is also coming off yet another playoff year, as Jason Ward's Raider team finished the regular season at 7-3 before falling in the first round of the postseason. Some solid players return for the Raiders this season. including 2-year starter Carson Heidecker at tackle and Lukas McKee at center on the offensive line. Andrew Champagne will take over at quarterback, while Joe Governale at running back and Drew Saki and Owen Menge at wide receiver will lead the offense. Defensively, Coach Ward is counting on Eli Caraballo and

Nick Reljin on the line and Tom Reljin at linebacker.

Keystone was a young squad last season, yet got to .500, finishing 5-5. Big things could be in store in Lagrange this fall. Don Griswold welcomes back senior quarterback Jacob Shackelford who sparkled last year by rushing for over 1000 yards and throwing for over 1100. Another senior, running back Dylan Naylor also rushed for over 1000. That's two big weapons for an offense that averaged over 27 points per game in '18. Defensively, the Cats gave up 29 points per game last year, so they will need to shore up that side of the ball. Coach Griswold is counting on Naylor (who racked up 95 tackles at safety last season), as well as linebackers Gavin Norris (who had 117 tackles in '18) and Gideon Lampron, along with lineman Alex Pataky to be key contributors defensively.

Firelands comes off a 4-6 season, but with 17 returning starters (9 on offense and 8 on defense); the expectations are high for the Falcons this year. Head Coach Ryan O'Rourke, now in his third year, has two great weapons returning on offense, 1st Team All David Richard

County, 2nd Team All Ohio wide receiver Alex Angle and another All County wide receiver in Caden Bomback. Junior quarterback Jacob Farley, who threw for seven touchdowns in three starts in '18, will try to get the ball to that duo as often as possible. Jacob Schmitz will anchor the offensive line for Firelands. The Falcons surrendered nearly 30 points per game last year, but those eight defensive returnees, led by senior linebackers Bryce Keown, Matt Loranger, and Nat Pignatella gained valuable experience and that area should improve this season.

Oberlin slipped to 3-7 last year, but Coach Mike Akers thinks things will improve this year. He has a bevy of returnees that allows him to feel that way. The Phoenix were another team that surrendered a ton of points last year (over 43 per game) so improving that side of the ball is a must. Key returnees include Aaron Hopkins, Riley Horning, and Charles Hershberger at linebacker, along with linemen Alex Rucker, Sam Thompson, and Jere-


miah Sutton. On offense, the Phoenix will be led by quarterback Azarie Hairston, along with Hopkins, Micha Jones Smith, and Donte Colbert at running back, and wide receiver Jayden Harris and newcomer Sam Fairplay. Continuing south on Route 58.

Wellington second year head coach Rob Howells returns nearly everybody from an incredibly young team that went 1-9 last year. Wellington will return 10 starters on each side of the ball, and their overall numbers are expected to increase dramatically as well. The Dukes know they gained some valuable experience a year ago as they prepare for the '19 season. Coach Howells will count heavily on four outstanding seniors. Two-way standout and 1st Team All County player Mason McClellan had a great year at running back last season, leading the team in rushing and receiving (averaging 21 yards per catch), compiling over 1,500 all-purpose yards, while also excelling on defense, totaling 50 tackles. Ben Higgins will start at quarterback

for the third straight year, and he has a great target (and blocker) in senior tight end Nick Laposky,



who also shone on defense, leading the team with 78 tackles. Nick was a first team All-County selection. Another senior, Jayson Keenan, was second in tackles with 60, and was big contributor at guard on offense. Keenan was another All-County pick.

One of three new head coaches in Lorain County this season is Scott O'Donnell at Brookside. O'Donnell arrives on the scene after serving as the head coach at Lake Catholic for five years. He inherits a program that has struggled of late, coming off a 1-9 season last year. Coach O'Donnell will rely on sophomore running back Kenny Grobolsek, senior wide receiver Zak Csalos, and junior wideout Matthew O'Donnell to create points in a balanced attack. On defense, the Cards return two senior linemen in John Pickens and Erik Kebeiks and another senior at linebacker in Christian Adkins. Brookside will have a blend of those seniors and several underclassmen as well, as Coach O'Donnell implements his program.

A remarkable coaching run has come to an end at **Black River**, where Al Young stepped down as the head coach of the Pirates after 29 years. In that time, Young's David Richard

teams won 198 games and he led them to ten playoff appearances. Former Black River star Kyle Clark, who had been Young's defensive coordinator for the past four years, will now take the helm. The Pirates are coming off a 6-4 campaign in 2018.

It was the tale of two diametrically opposite football seasons in Elyria last fall. At Elyria Catholic, head coach Brian Fox burst onto the scene and led the Panthers to a Great Lakes Conference championship and a post season berth before dropping a heartbreaking 42-41 game to Genoa in the regional semifinal. Fox was named the Ohio Division V Coach of the Year as the Panthers finished 9-3. EC graduated some terrific talent off that playoff team, but Fox has several outstanding players back, including All-State tackle Branson Taylor and all conference center Darrius Randleman, as well as two all-conference wide receivers in junior Jaret Frantz and senior Connor Trockley. On defense, another All-Ohio player in cornerback Jack Griffin is back, as well as veteran linebackers Zach Gorczyca and Josh Miller.

At Elyria, the Pioneers were

winless in '18 so new head coach Devlin Culliver's first goal is to simply change the culture. Culliver had previous head coaching stints at Maple Heights and Painesville Harvey. The good news for Elyria is several starters will be returning in '19, including three of five on the offensive line, led by senior Nate Bryant. Dylan Sharlow is back at quarterback, and will count on returnees such as running back Jaheim Atkinson and wide receiver Jesse Stevens to put points on the board. Defensively, Bryant, along with veterans Ben Doehr and Mike Knapp, will lead a contingent that Coach Culliver expects to run and hit aggressively. Competing in the rugged Greater Cleveland Conference and coming off a year in which Elyria surrendered 44 points a game, the Pioneers must improve on that side of the ball.

In **Lorain**, the Titans come off a 6-4 season. Dave McFarland's club returns some dynamite offensive players from a team that averaged 36 points per game in '18. Quarterback Jordan Jackson, receiver Tyshawn Lighty, and running backs Daylin Dower and Savon Chavis will provide some firepower. Chavis and Lighty along with Devante Jackson are holdovers on defense, which graduated eight starters.

The SWC provides terrific football year and year out. This season should be no different. Avon has one of the premier programs in Ohio, and the Eagles will look to keep things rolling in 2019. Coming off a 12-2 season and a second straight state semi-final appearance, the Eagles will reload this fall. Offensively, it starts up front where Ball State commit Tommy Lorincz and D1 prospect Joe Svec will anchor the line that also features veteran center Mason Bingham. Dynamic running back Nick Perusek, who rushed for over 1,200 yards last season returns as does leading receiver Tommy Purcell and wideout Joey Lance. Danny Zeh will become the quarterback for an offense that averaged over 45 points per game. Just up Route 83.

Avon Lake comes off a great year as well. The Shoremen tied

the Eagles for the SWC title and finished 10-2 after advancing two rounds in the playoffs. Matt Kostelnik's team returns six veterans on offense and five on defense so another special season could unfold. Offensively, Nate Sidlowski, and Creed Bolognia are a marvelous tandem at wide receiver, while on defense, Nick Marsh, Jack McCrum, Zac Kovacs will anchor the line, backed up Nico LaBianca at linebacker and Kai Kuwalu and Josh Vlasak in the secondary. The Shoremen also have an extraordinary kicker in Harry Hebert.

At Amherst, the Comets battled the upper echelon in the SWC before finishing at 6-4. Coach Mike Passarello will be relying on veterans such as senior Aidan Johnson, a first team All-County player who led the Comets in tackles last year, as well as fellow seniors Kyle Ferguson, a two-way player at wide receiver and defensive back, and Clay Carpenter, a two-way lineman. Lavell Gibson is another two-way linemen expected to be a leader on the team. Midview struggled through a 2-8 season last year, but will return numerous starters on both sides of the ball. Head coach DJ Shaw is counting on several veteran two-way players to bring the Middies back to winning ways. Among those are quarterback/

safety Zac Gill, running back/ defensive end Ty Nelson, running back/defensive back Dom Roman, wide receiver/defensive back Nathan Bashak, and twoway lineman Dan Bucknavich. The Middies surrendered over 41 points per game in '18, so that side of the ball will be a primary focus this year.

At **North Ridgeville**, the Rangers look to improve on a 4-6 record last year and coach Luke Durbin has several excellent players returning to help them accomplish that. Up front offensively senior linemen John Leili and Dustin McElhaney are back as is tight end Alex Habyl. Senior running back Shane Swindig who led the Rangers in rushing in '18 returns as well. On the defensive side, Howell will be in the line along with veteran Patrick Cas-



selberry, while returning at linebacker is Tyler Richmond and Mason Grow. The always tough Bulldogs from Olmsted Falls, along with North Olmsted, Westlake, Berea-Midpark and Lakewood round out the 10-team SWC. This will be Lakewood's final year in the league before they head to the Great Lakes Conference next season.

Vermilion enters 2019 off a 3-7 record in '18, and without a senior on the squad this year. The Sailors will be young and learn on the fly, with only one returning starter in two-way player Ryan Baxter, who performed at linebacker and running back last season. Second year head coach Brett Colohan and his staff will certainly need to have patience as this young squad develops through the season, especially in the competitive Sandusky Bay Conference.

It's that time of year. High School football is about to begin. The coaches, the players, and everyone involved in this great game are ready to start. Are you ready? Let's kick it off.



There's always excitement in the air when the high school football season approaches but this year just may come with a little more anticipation.

The reason? The formation of the "New" Lorain County Conference consisting of seven county former Patriot Athletic teams and Black River, who's district actually stretches into part of Lorain County. Brookside, Clearview, Columbia, Firelands, Keystone, Oberlin and Wellington join Black River in forming the "New" Lorain County Conference.

The "old" conference disbanded in 2005. Originally, the Lorain County Conference formed in 1986 and consisted of Avon, Brookside, Clearview, Elyria West, Firelands, Keystone, Oberlin and Wellington. Midview replaced West in 1996 when West closed its doors. The new conference promises to be very competitive. The schools are all very close in enrollments. According to the Ohio High School Athletic Association, Clearview, with 234 boys enrolled, is the largest and Columbia, with 118 boys, the smallest. The rest are all in between. By comparison, the old PAC schools that have left, were Buckeye (307 boys), Lutheran West (182), Fairview (196) and Brooklyn (167).

Two of the "dean" of Lorain County coaches – Clearview's Mike Collier and Columbia's Jason Ward both expressed excitement with the new set-up.

"The new league is perfect as far as I'm concerned," said Ward. "It's exciting to play all the smaller Lorain County schools every year instead of once every couple years for crossover games. I think Columbia fans will miss the rivalry we've had with Lutheran West a little bit but this league opens up the possibility of new rivalries for everyone."

Collier, who is both the football coach and athletic director at Clearview pretty much echoed Ward's feelings.

"We are very excited about the Lorain County League," he said. "There are many long-standing rivalries that will continue and be enhanced by facing area teams on a more consistent basis. We believe this will be good for our student-athletes and our communities. Our relationships, respect and rivalries will make this an outstanding league for our school districts."

Jeff Jump, who is Columbia's AD but was at Wellington previously, also agrees with the new league.

"We are very excited about the new league," he said. "We've David Richard

always had a good rivalry with Clearview but are excited about the new ones that will develop. The one we'll miss would be Lutheran West but I like the idea of all Lorain County teams. We'll have one division and play all the teams and have a true conference champion."

While Collier and Ward have been around a while, all the other coaches in the new league feel good about moving forward with the "New" LCC.

Mike Akers, Oberlin's coach, promised he'd bring stability to the Phoenix program and he certainly has done that. Oberlin, one of the smaller schools, should benefit from the change.

"I like it," Akers said. "It's like the old LCC before the PAC came in. It's good we don't have to see Buckeye and I think because of

the local teams playing each other. I don't know if have any rivalries nor do I think we lost any so it's not an issue for us. It'll help at the county meetings, too."

John Carter, Oberlin's Athletic Director, agreed with Akers. Oberlin will play some of its home games at Oberlin College's Dill Field, a turf facility.

"I agree with Mike 100 percent," he said. "This will be good for Oberlin because we'll play Wellington and Firelands every year and we haven't played either in football in about three years. We're also excited to be playing both of them at the college this year."

Black River may be the only school located outside of Lorain County but the Pirates have had a long history of playing against Wellington and Keystone and is happy to be included in the new set up. Ted Gordon, the AD at Black River, was pleased that the other schools from the PAC landed in conferences also.

"The four schools – Buckeye, Brooklyn, Fairview and Lutheran West – all had conferences to go into," said Gordon, who also spent a number of years teaching and coaching at Keystone. "You'll still see them popping up on the schedules here and there.

"The nice thing is the eightteam league gives us the opportunity to play every year. For example, we weren't seeing Columbia maybe every few years and only once a year in basketball. Now with the home-away, we'll see Columbia and Clearview and Oberlin. Having that opportunity will be nice for both schools and the league."

Keystone Athletic Director Jonathon Bailey is new to the area but understands the value of the new league for the Wildcats.

"I'm looking forward to it," he said. "I think it will be competitive for all sports and drive competition between our local schools. We are very fortunate in Lorain County to have fantastic sports following and this new league will be a great platform to feature the smaller schools in Lorain County."

Ryan O'Rourke, who was a Golden Helmet winner in 2008, is back for his second year at Fire-

lands and is looking forward to the new conference.

"I think it's a great layout with the teams in it now," he said. "Feels a bit like the Lorain County Conference of old when my brother (Justin) played at Avon. I think it's going to be a conference with great competition year-in and year-out with schools that are in a similar situation.

"Give all the credit to Buckeye and what they did in the PAC for years. They have a great staff and program and I wish them the best along with Lutheran West, Fairview and Brooklyn in their new conferences."

Firelands' AD, Ty Stillman, is also looking forward to the competition of the new league.

"I love the fact that it is a Lorain County league for schools that have D4 through D6 football small school feel. It will be great for our kids, parents and communities. It will be the job of the individual schools to broaden the conferences' reach throughout Northeast Ohio as one that can take on all comers. Some of the teams already do that – Keystone in softball and Columbia in football. It's a good move for Firelands and I look forward to years and years of great conference play."

Black River's long-time coach Al Young retired this past year but assistant coach Kyle Clark will take the reins of the Pirates this season. "Kyle played for Al back in the early 2000s," said Gordon. "He played at Ashland University and he's been our defensive coordinator for the past three-four years."

Clark isn't the only new coach for the new conference. Brookside and Wellington also have

new faces leading their respective programs.

Wellington's athletic director John Bowman likes the fact the Dukes will play Oberlin and Clearview every year.

"This will continue our rivalries with Keystone and Black River and renew our old rivalries with Oberlin and Clearview," Bowman said. "There's a lot of history between all eight schools in the league and all games will be important. I like the fact the league is not divided into divisions like the PAC was."

Wellington's 2nd year head coach Rob Howells admitted he doesn't know the history but he's excited just the same.

"I feel the conference will be great for the local smaller schools and should generate many rivalries and excitement for all athletic contests because we're all so close geographically," said Howells.

Count Brookside AD Dick Kerschbaum on the positive side as is Cardinals' new head coach Scott O'Donnell.

"It'll renew on a regular basis many of the old rivalries for our school," said Kerschbaum. "Competively, I think it will be good for Brookside in getting

athletes and fans to increase participation." "I know our players and our community are excited," said O'Donnell. "I know there's a couple rivalries that won't exist anymore and I think we'll miss playing those teams but the new teams should fill the void."

This year, Ross will begin his first year as a defensive assistant at Rutgers and will work primarily with defensive backs. "Coaching is something I always wanted to do. My life's motto has been, play football as long as I can, and when I can't play anymore, coach."

Ross says, he began thinking about that career path in middle school. "My dad coached me at peewee football, and I feel the way my dad impacted me on the football field, that's the impact I want to have on other kids. 

2019 Ohio State Football Preview

Ryan Day officially became the 25th Head Coach in the 130th year of OSU football on January 2nd 2019, one day after OSU beat Washington 28-23 in the 2019 Rose Bowl on New Year's Day.

One of the biggest storylines for OSU this season is will be how Day takes over the reins for former Coach Urban Meyer. Meyer lost a total of nine games in his seven seasons as the head coach in Columbus. That alone tells you the challenge that awaits Coach Day replacing Meyer. Long time University of Michigan Defensive Coordinator Greg Mattison now holds the same position with the Buckeyes, taking over for the departed Greg Schiano. Former Indiana University head coach Kevin Wilson is now with Ohio State as the team's Offensive Coordinator and may take over play calling from Ryan Day as the season progresses.

Looking at the team, Ohio State

returns 51 letter winners, 19 on offense side of the ball, 29 on the defensive side, and three specialists. Ohio State also returns 13 starters, four on offense and nine on defense.

Who will replace Heisman Finalist Dwayne Haskins as the OSU signal caller? That task will more than likely go to University of Georgia transfer Justin Fields, who is the preseason favorite at quarter back. However, he will have competition from West Virginia University transfer Chris Chugunov for the top spot.

At running back, J.K. Dobbins is



back for his junior season. He is the first Buckeye running back in school history to rush for over 1,000 yards in both his freshmen and sophomore seasons.

K.J. Hill, a fifth year senior, is expected to lead the receiving core. Hill is currently on a streak of catching at least one pass over a span of 34 consecutive games. During his time at Ohio State, he has 144 career receptions. Along with Hill, teammates Austin Mack (21 career starts), Binjimen Victor (12 career TD's) and Chris Olave (2 TD's vs. University of Michigan last season and a blocked punt that went for a touchdown on special teams) are also expected to contribute.

The Buckeyes have plenty of depth at tight end including former Lorain Titan Rashod Berry. The fifth year senior started four games at TE a year ago.

Graduation has hit the offensive line hard. Gone are Isaiah Prince, Michael Jordan, Demetrius Knox, and Malcolm Pridgeon. The Buck-

eyes foursome started a combined 116 games in scarlet and gray. Thayer Munford returns to the O-Line after starting 13 games last season. He is expected to settle back in at left tackle this season. After missing a year to injury,

Branden Bowen is back and

healthy. He had started six games in 2017 before being injured. The Buckeye defense should be their strength in 2019 with nine starters returning from last year's 13-1 squad. The D-Line has depth, back are starting defensive ends Chase Young and Jonathon Cooper. At defensive tackle, Robert Landers and Davon Hamilton have also returned to the silver bullet front. Pushing this unit are a group of sophomores who saw playing time as true freshmen, among this group are Tyreke Smith, Tyler Friday, Taron Vincent, and Tommy Togiai.

If running backs sneak past that tenacious front they will be met by a group of line backers led by Tuf Borland (67 tackles in 2018), Malik Harrison (81 tackles in 2018), and

sons coaching in the National Football League. He leads a contingent of experienced cornerbacks headed by Damon Arnette, Jeffrey Okudah, and Shaun Wade. That trio started a combined 27 games a year ago. Senior captain Jordan Fuller will lead the safeties along with Powell, Ohio native Brendon White, who was the defensive MVP of the 2019 Rose Bowl.

Looking at the schedule, Ohio State will begin the 2019 regular season Labor Day weekend hosting Coach Lane Kiffin's Florida Atlantic University Owls on Saturday August 31st. Three of the first four games this season will be played in Columbus. That should help the Buckeyes get off to a good start to 2019.

The middle part of the schedule will test Ohio State with some interesting matchups. The Buckeyes start that stretch on the road in Lincoln against Nebraska, September 28th. The Bucks return to Columbus the following Saturday for a night game versus Michigan State University. Following a bye week, OSU will play on Friday night October 18th at Northwestern and end the tough stretch at home against Wisconsin on Saturday October 26th. How the Buckeyes do over that four game stretch will more than likely determine their postseason chances.

They will end the regular season on Saturday November 30th in Ann Arbor against the Wolverines. That game could very well determine who wins the Eastern Division and goes to the Big Ten Championship game the following Saturday in Indianapolis.

After suffering through two and a half years of the Hue Jackson era in Cleveland, Browns fans finally had something to cheer about for most of last season, when they saw their first seven win season since 2014, and were just a win away from their first winning season in 12 years. The Browns made a flurry of moves in trades and free agency that certainly made headlines throughout the off season, which will give fans much higher expectations in the 2019 season.

Beginning with the most important position in all of sports, the Browns appear to finally have their man at quarterback. Baker Mayfield was everything Browns fans had hoped for and then some in his rookie season, when he set a new NFL record for rookies by throwing 27 touchdown passes last season. The first year signal caller completed 63.8-percent of his passes, while throwing for 3,725 yards and the aforementioned 27 touchdowns in his rookie campaign, which certainly sets the bar high for a sophomore season. Not only did he post very impressive passing numbers, but more importantly, the Browns were 7-7 in games in which Mayfield started, a far cry from going 0-16 the previous season.

In the backfield with Mayfield will be another 2018 draftee, tailback Nick Chubb. Chubb, like Mayfield, was all Browns fans hoped he would be, rushing for 996 yards and eight touchdowns, while averaging 5.2 yards per

carry. He also added 20 receptions for 149 yards and hauled in a pair of touchdown passes as well. What's more impressive is that Chubb did this while sharing a good chunk of the load through half the season. Joining Chubb in the backfield will be Cleveland area native Kareem Hunt, who's signing comes with a bit of controversy. Because of that, he'll be sidelined for half the season. Should he return in the shape he was in before being released in 2018, Hunt and Chubb would form a 1-2 punch in the backfield that would be hard for anyone in the NFL to match. In his first two seasons in the NFL. Hunt ran for 2,151 yards, 15 touchdowns, and averaged 4.7 yards per carry. He also caught 79 passes for 833 yards during that stretch with 10 touchdown grabs. It remains to be seen if Duke Johnson will be a part of this group.

What was once looked at as the team's primary weakness, the void of playmakers, this year's wide receiving corps will be looked at as one of the most talented in the NFL. Not only do the Browns return Jarvis Landry, their leading receiver last year who hauled in 81 passes for 976 yards and four touchdowns, but they will pair him with his college teammate, the charismatic Odell Beckham Jr. The 2019 season will be Beckham's sixth in the NFL, and he's coming off a strong 2018 season where he caught 77 passes for 1,052 yards and six touchdowns. He's caught 90 passes or more in three of his first five seasons, and he's registered four 1,000-plus yard receiving seasons

in his career as well. His last two seasons have been riddled with a few injuries, limiting him to just four games in 2017 and only 12 games last year. If he stays healthy, pairing him next to Landry will give opposing teams fits all throughout the fall, and perhaps into January.

Complimenting that dynamic receiving duo will be second year pro Antonio Callaway, Rashard "Hollywood" Higgins, and tight end David Njoku. Callaway caught 43 passes for 586 yards and five touchdowns last year while Higgins was on the receiving end of 39 passes for 572 yards and caught a career best four touchdown passes. Njoku, a first round pick in 2017, had the finest year of his career, catching 56 passes for 639 yards and four touchdown passes. Based on all of that, I think it's safe to say that this group is about as talented as this unit has been in at least 10 years.

It's always difficult to assess the success of an offensive line through numbers. On the whole, if you're not talking about the big boys up front, that's probably a good thing. This unit doesn't have a whole lot of depth, but it does have some talent, and more importantly, reliability. They'll have the all important job of keeping Baker Mayfield upright, and creating running room for Chubb, Hunt, or whomever is in the backfield with Mayfield. The group returns 4 of 5 starters from a season ago, but will have to replace right guard Kevin Zeitler who was traded to the Giants in the off season. The Browns are hopeful that

their second round pick in 2018, Austin Corbett, can fill in admirably and shine in his second season as a pro. It is imperative that he performs well for this unit to succeed. Last year, when Greg Robinson took over at left tackle nine weeks in, this unit allowed only 5 sacks the rest of the season.

Defensively, there's plenty of room for improvement, but the Browns have made some moves on paper that should have the fan base very excited. On the defensive front, the Browns are very talented and they have a lot of experience with this group. Myles Garrett has done what you expect a first overall pick to do over his first two years in Cleveland. He'll be paired with Olivier Vernon, who the Browns received in a trade with the New York Giants this off season. Vernon, a 6-foot-2-inch 260 pound defensive end, registered seven sacks last season, despite playing just 11 games. He's totaled 6.5 sacks or more in each of his last six seasons. On the interior, the Browns have the tandem of Larry Ogunjobi and newly acquired

Sheldon Richardson. Richardson was a massive addition this off season. The 13th overall pick in the 2013 draft has had a terrific career. He should have no problems shedding blockers, and in this defense could see fewer double teams, leading to more time in opposing teams' backfields.

The linebacker group on this team is a bit raw at this point. Last year, this group was riddled with some injuries and a lot of missed tackles cost them. The two familiar faces in this group, Joe Schobert and Christian Kirksey, will lead a group primarily made of rookies. One thing is for sure, while there are some unknowns in this group, the experienced and very talented defensive line in front them should occupy lots of blockers, giving these guys plenty of opportunities to shine.

In the defensive backfield, much like the linebackers, this is a group with some excitement, and a bit of uncertainty as well. Denzel Ward, one of the Browns' first round picks in 2018, saw a nice rookie season cut short due to injuries. He did have three interceptions in 13 games and defended 11 passes before his season came to an end. He'll be joined by Greedy Williams, a second round pick this past April out of LSU. While the Browns are young at the cornerback position, they have a bit more experience at the two starting safety spots, with Damarious Randle returning for his second season with the Browns, and Morgan Burnett, a former Pittsburg Steeler and Green Bay Packer, will join the mix as well.

The moves the Browns made on


paper look great, but as we all know, games aren't won and lost on paper. A big question coming into this season is how will first vear Head Coach Freddie Kitchens mesh all of these larger than life personalities? After serving as the interim offensive coordinator during the last half of the 2018 season, Kitchens will now wear the headset that matters most on Sundays, and faces a much different challenge than any other Browns coach over the last 11 years. His challenge requires winning right away, and the expectation is that they will need to win at least 8 games for this year to be looked at as an improvement. Whereas every other coach that has taken over through the last 11 years has inherited a roster with very little talent, knowing that a 5 or 6 win season would be considered an improvement.

I don't think I'm going out on a limb here by saying 5 or 6 wins this year will not be acceptable in any form or fashion. For this year to be considered a success, the Brown and Orange are going to have to be in playoff contention, and anything less than 9 or 10 wins should be considered a bit of a disappointment.
